

a letter from the president

Dear Friends,

In last year's programme I suggested that 'Beauty and the Beast' would provide us different production challenges. This has come true; but I feel all have been met and mastered by our production team. Trying to work, or liase with, large corporate bodies such as Disney brings its own challenges as I believe others have discovered. The Disney empire has many branches. I thought that I had a reasonably clear memory of my childhood delights, especially the many 'Fairy Tales' that I learned at that time; including of course 'Beauty and the Beast'. I now know how misguided that thought was. I have learned that 'Beauty' is a French fairy tale. Hence names like LeFou and Gaston. All fairy tales require magic and spells, wizards and witches, but I had forgotten about spells including cups and saucers, pots and pans, plates and cutlery etc. Magic mirrors are especially essential. Some people have told me that they don't know the music. I hope that they will agree with me after the show that it is great. We feel honoured to have been invited by the Mayor of Swindon to take part in his Charity Concert at the Wyvern Theatre on January 21st 2011 - we are delighted to accept the invitation. Looking ahead to October 2011, I am thrilled to tell you that our next big production will be 'Crazy for You'. Just think of all the Gershwin songs it contains. Think of 'I got Rhythm', 'Embraceable You', 'Nice Work if You Can Get it' and others. I normally suggest that you now sit back and allow us to transport you to a certain period of time. Today that period will depend entirely upon your age. It will be set by the date of your first 'Fairy Tale'.

director's comment

We started working on "Beauty" in August 2009 and for a while we were planning for it alongside our preparations for last year's "My Fair Lady". We knew that in order to do the show justice, it would be a production on a scale that SALOS had never seen before and it is probably even one of the biggest shows that the Wyvern Theatre has hosted. It is the first Disney musical that the society has presented and it has been an exciting opportunity for all involved; however that is not to say that we haven't been challenged at times by the demands of 2 cast members flying, pyrotechnics on stage, a professional touring set, costumes that do not fit backstage at the theatre, projection, over 100 sound effects, over 300 lighting cues, as well as a whole host of other things!

"Beauty" has allowed SALOS the opportunity to demonstrate the versatility and talents of its members in the cast; I am sure you will not only enjoy seeing members that you recognise from previous shows being inanimate objects, but also that you will also be thoroughly impressed with their performances in presenting such a well known animated tale live on stage. I would like to personally thank the cast for their commitment, as well as their sense of humour and patience at rehearsals! I would like to particularly mention the children who have joined us for this production; they were selected from an open audition earlier in the year and they have worked so hard ever since.

Once again, I have been privileged to lead a great production team and I thank them for their respective roles in bringing this show together. "Beauty & the Beast" has required a small army of people to make it happen and there are nearly 100 people involved either on or offstage for each performance. Thank you to each and every one of you; without you none of this would have been possible.

The story of "Beauty and the Beast" is more than 'Disney' and can be traced back to pre 18th Century; the concept of true beauty being found within really is a 'tale as old as time', yet continues to have relevance to most of us. The physical transformations we see on stage represent the change within and in "Beauty" we can appreciate how the world can be transformed, both inwardly and outwardly, by the powers we all have within us.



malcolm webb Musical Director

Malcolm is delighted to be working with SALOS again as Musical Director for this year's production of Beauty and the Beast. Born in Swindon, Malcolm studied flute with Wilfred Smith (Principal Flute-Covent Garden Orchestra) and now has a busy and varied schedule of both playing and conducting. In his role as Musical Director, Malcolm has a growing number of musical credits to his name, including 'South Pacific', 'Kiss Me Kate', 'Oklahoma!', 'Me & My Girl', 'Anything Goes', 'The Scarlet Pimpernel', 'Singing in the Rain', 'Mack & Mabel' & 'Thoroughly Modern Millie'. Malcolm has also worked with Musical Theatre and Operatic groups in Wootton Bassett, Cirencester and Chippenham. He is conductor of the Swindon Symphony Orchestra through which he champions the use of local soloists. He is Principal Flute with the British Police Symphony Orchestra, and also plays with the North Wiltshire Orchestra with whom he performed the Ibert Flute Concerto earlier in March.

Judith hockaday Choreographer

Judith Hockaday was trained at The Dorothy Greenhill School, Reading, The Royal Academy of Dancing and the Arts Educational Trust. She has been Principal of her own school here in Swindon for 50 years and former students can be found dancing and teaching professionally in ballet companies and stage shows here in the UK and abroad. Ms Hockaday is a Fellow and Examiner for The Imperial Society of Teachers of Dance Imperial Ballet, Modern Theatre, Tap and National Dance Faculties. In 2006 she was awarded the prestigious I.S.T.D Imperial Award for services to dance and dance training.



Alan is still combining the posts of Society Chairman and Stage Manager. He is looking at Beauty and the Beast with some trepidation as the technical requirements are far and above those in use 24 years ago when he took over as stage manager. Back then SALOS did not even use microphones let alone any of the special effects that make this show so special. Alan's day job is that of a hydraulics engineer working mostly with the designers of heavy earthmoving equipment, such an ordinary world compared to the wonderland inhabited by the characters in this show. The planning of Beauty has taken up even more time than usual this summer, mostly with his daughter Sarah who is now taking on so much more of the show organisation. However he has still found time to continue some umpiring on the cricket pitch, to light several shows at the Arts Centre, and to rehearse for retirement by having a few more holiday breaks away with wife Christine.

Judith sharp Chorus Mistress

Judith started studying music at the age of 8 and quickly realised that her chosen instrument would be her voice. She first conducted a choir at school when she was 16 and then acquired the skills of a Chorus Mistress over the next two decades as a playing member of two amateur light operatic groups. She was invited to become SALOS Chorus Mistress in 1999 and, in that role, in addition to the annual show, has enjoyed the musical challenge of the last 7 SALOS concerts. She also directs the music for the musicals she stages at the Arts Centre with her singing partner, Ray Dance, last year raising £3000 for Help for Heroes. They are currently planning their

next production at the Arts Centre in June 2011.

sarah wrizon

Deputy Stage Manager

As you read this Sarah is probably attempting to remain calm. Beauty and the Beast is by far the biggest and technically most challenging show that she has ever been involved in. Her role of Deputy Stage Manager started much earlier than usual with this production and although she has very much enjoyed all the extra work and planning that it has involved, it has definitely taken over her life for the past year! It will be a big challenge to make sure everything runs smoothly, having to coordinate over 400 lighting, flying and stage cues. Sarah will certainly be kept busy for every minute of the show. This is the fifth show that Sarah has been Deputy Stage Manager for SALOS; she is looking forward to working the authentic touring set and hopes to play her part in making this production as special as it deserves to be.


