

a message from the president

Dear Friends


the story of the show

It goes wrong. Jigger escapes and Billy is cornered. Rather than face Julie and a long jail sentence he stabs himself and dies. Billy arrives at the back gates to Heaven! The star keeper tells him that if there is anything he has left undone on earth he can have one day back there to make amends. Fifteen years have passed and Louise, his daughter, is having a bad time. She's unhappy, other children, in particular the Snow children of which there are many, taunt her about her father. Billy is incensed by what he sees and he grabs his last change to do something good for Julie and Louise. Have a hanky ready!!






alison canning


mark newton (Enoch Snow)


mike viret (Jigger Craigin)


sarah jefferies (Chorus Mistress)






























judith hockaday

(Dance Choreographer)


