

FIDDLER ON THE ROOF - PLOT SYNOPSIS

Set in the small Jewish village of Anatevka, Russia, in 1905, the story is primarily concerned with the efforts of Tevye, a dairyman, Golde, his wife, and their five daughters as they cope with their harsh existence under the Tsarist rule. The opening song 'Tradition' explains the role of God's law in providing balance in the villagers' lives; Tevye ends the song by insisting that without their traditions, he and the other villagers would find their lives 'as shaky as a fiddler on the roof'. Meanwhile, Tevye's daughters wonder if Yente the matchmaker will ever find them the men of their dreams: Yente tells Golde that she has selected the butcher, Lazar Wolf, as a match for Tzeitel. A group of villagers inform Tevye of a violent pogrom in a nearby village. Tevye invites Perchik, a young revolutionary student, to come to his home for the Sabbath dinner and arranges for him to give lessons to his daughters. Motel, the tailor attempts to ask Tevye for Tzeitel's hand in marriage, but instead gets tongue-tied; the family and their guests welcome the Sabbath. After which, Tevye goes to meet Lazar Wolf at the Inn and they agree on the match and celebrate with the local villagers and Russians; on the way home Tevye meets the Constable who warns him that a demonstration is going to be planned against the Jews of Anatevka. Tevye tells Tzeitel that she is to be married to Lazar Wolf, Golde rejoices, but Motel tells Tevye that he and Tzeitel gave each other a pledge to marry and, after a struggle with himself, Tevye agrees to the match. Scared of Golde's reaction, Tevye invents a wild nightmare to convince Golde that a match with Lazar would result in Tzeitel's death at the hands of Lazar's first wife. Fruma-Sarah: Golde is so horrified that she insists on a marriage between Motel & Tzeitel. In the street when villagers are gossiping about the mix-up in Tzeitel's wedding plans, Chava is stopped by a group of Russians who taunt her; Fyedka insists they stop. The wedding of Tzeitel and Motel takes place, but the celebrations are interrupted by the Constable and his men. Tevye reflects on the incident with God. Perchik tells Hodel that he is leaving to work for justice in Kiev; he proposes to her and she accepts; he promises to send for her as soon as he can. Tevye approves in spite of his misgivings as he can see his daughter loves Perchik: Tevye and Golde consider if their own arranged marriage has somehow brought them love. Tevye takes Hodel to the railroad station; she is leaving for Siberia where Perchik has been sent after his arrest. Meanwhile, Chava and Fydeka's relationship has also led to intention to marry; however Tevye refuses, telling Chava she cannot contemplate marrying outside of her faith. Tevye and the villagers receive news from the Constable that, on orders, they have to leave their homes and the village of Anatevka.

A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Dear Friends,

When writing my message I always find it very interesting, if we have previously produced the show, to look back in time and to appreciate the changes that have taken place.

My main theme for 'Fiddler on the Roof' in April 1981 was to express gratitude for the existence of the Wyvern Theatre, then approaching its tenth birthday. It has now passed its 36th birthday! The early problems, as I recall, were mainly financial ones, with rumours of cutbacks and even closure. The modern problem can be summed up in one word – asbestos. In 1981 I congratulated and thanked those responsible for the provision of this – our theatre. I now congratulate and thank those responsible for the resurrection of the Wyvern. Particularly when viewing the numerous alterations and improvements that have been made here.

The SALOS President, though only a figurehead within the life of 'Swindon's Premier Music Society', does have to take responsibility for his own actions. As members will know, at last year's show selection evening, the voting reached a stalemate. Rather than go through the whole process again, the members agreed that the President should have the deciding vote. Now- never having voted in this ballot before, and remembering that Fiddler had been runner up for the previous two years, and was one of my favourite shows, I selfishly said - 'Fiddler'. So what ever happens today - it is all my fault!

One of my favourite memories of the 1981 production is the 'Bottle Dance'. Rehearsals were often hilarious. A number of participants are still members. Unfortunately, one of my long-standing friends, who took part then, died just a few months ago. Peter Smith was a member of this society for many years, during which time he was not only on stage, but produced several of our local concerts. Even after his retirement he continued to be one of our regular supporters.



I am delighted to tell you that our 2008 production is to be 'Thoroughly Modern Millie'.

For today, just settle down comfortably in your new seats in your nearly new theatre. The story and theme of 'Fiddler on the Roof' is well known to all. Just let me bid you "Mazeltov" and as you leave the theatre, Tevye's last words to Chava, "God be with you".

PERCHIK -JAMES CANNING



RUSSELL LANGDOWN - DIRECTOR



Russell is a professional teacher of Performing Arts in a local secondary school and also teaches drama at the highly regarded Judith Hockaday School of Dance & Drama. He has trained in dance with Judith Hockaday from an early age and more recently in singing with Swindon's Sarah Jefferies. His practical experience of theatre, gained in performing, has been achieved through playing principal roles in SALOS productions over a number of years, including Bill Calhoun in 'Kiss Me Kate' and Jesus in 'Jesus Christ Superstar'. In addition to SALOS, Russell is a member of the Phoenix Players and has also performed in Ray Dance & Judith Sharp's productions, with roles including Lt Cable in 'South Pacific' and Barnaby Tucker in 'Hello Dolly'. Russell has been asked to perform with other societies and earlier this year took the role of Cosmo Brown in 'Singin' in the Rain' for GODS in Gloucester. Russell has always had a passion for production and has staged the last four SALOS concerts with Heather Reynolds; in recent years, he has also enjoyed and benefited from working with, and being coached by, directors Pat Donovan and Daphne Worster. Russell has thoroughly enjoyed the experience of directing 'Fiddler on the Roof'; a great way to mark his 20th annual production with the society.

MALCOLM WEBB - MUSICAL DIRECTOR

Fiddler on the Roof marks Malcolm's third production as Musical Director for SALOS, Swindon's premier musical theatre company. Born in Swindon, Malcolm studied flute with Wilfred Smith (Principal Flute-Covent Garden Orchestra) and now has a busy and varied schedule of both playing and conducting. In his role as Musical Director, Malcolm has a growing number of musical credits to his name, including 'South Pacific', 'Kiss Me Kate',' Oklahoma!', 'Me & My Girl', 'Anything Goes', 'The Scarlet Pimpernel' and 'High Society'. Earlier this year Malcolm was invited to conduct the Cirencester College Performing Arts production of 'Anything Goes'. He will also make his debut as Musical Director with Cirencester Operatic Society in spring 2008. He held the post of Director of Music with the Band of the Wiltshire Constabulary for approximately 13 years and has worked regularly with Swindon Opera over the last 10 years. He is currently conductor of the Swindon Symphony Orchestra. With so much time taken in conducting and directing, Malcolm tries hard not to neglect his own playing. He is Principal Flute with the British Police Symphony Orchestra, with whom he regularly tours the UK and with whom he has performed as a soloist. He also plays with the North Wiltshire Orchestra, which regularly performs in Chippenham.



JUDITH HOCKADAY -DANCE CHOREOGRAPHER

Judith came to the Society in 1983 and has choreographed the dancing for many of the shows since, including 'The New Moon', 'Kismet', 'South Pacific', 'Hello Dolly', 'Gigi', 'Half a Sixpence', 'Brigadoon', 'Funny Girl', 'My Fair Lady', 'Anything Goes', 'Show Boat', 'Me and My Girl', 'Carousel', 'Mack & Mabel', 'Music Man', 'Oklahoma!', 'Oliver', 'Jesus Christ Superstar' and 'Kiss Me Kate'. She has been the principal of her own school of dancing in Swindon for 45 years and is a triple examiner for the Imperial Society of Teachers of Dancing. In 1976 she won the Isobel Haxwell Trophy for outstanding work in national dance, and later that year the Gordon Edwards Trust Award for overseas study. Former




